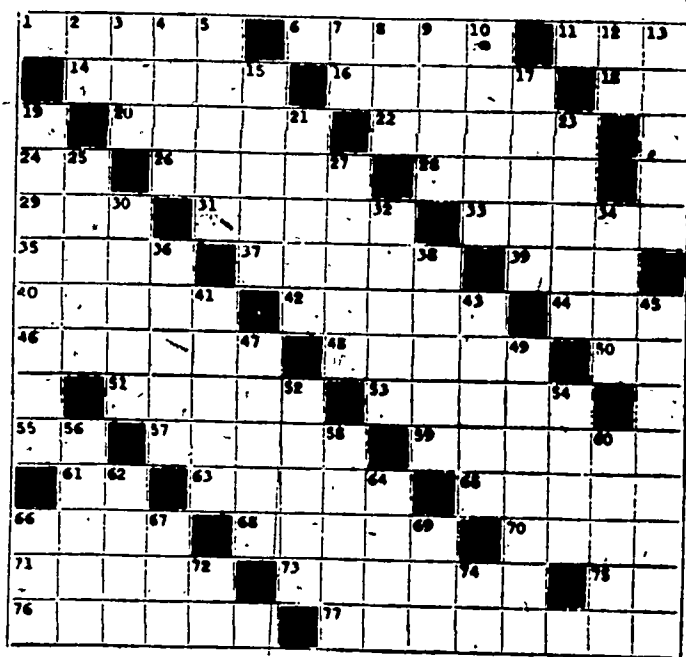


OUR CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

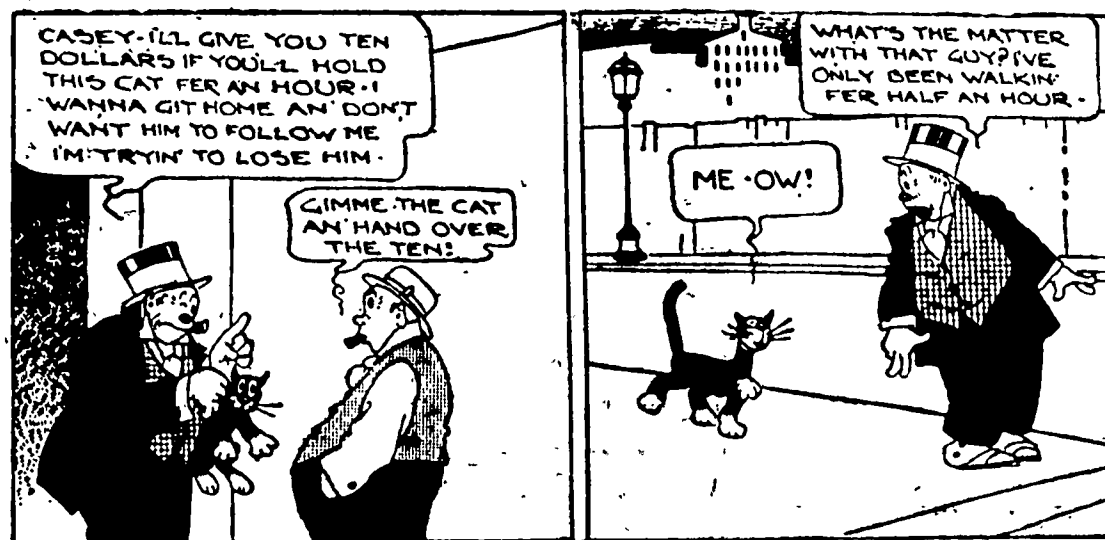
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IOWA HAS LESS THAN 2,000 \$10,000 MEN

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Iowa boasted of less than 2,000 citizens who reported income of \$10,000 or more for the year 1924, according to a report issued today by the United States bureau of internal revenue. The state returned 135,864 incomes, of which 128,821 were incomes under \$5,000, 5,154 incomes of \$5,000 to \$10,000 and 1,889 incomes of \$10,000 and more. The total net incomes reported amounted to \$486,857,674, which figures an average return of \$2,919 for the 135,864 persons reporting. The total tax paid by these amounting to \$4,892,543 or an average of \$36 a person reporting.

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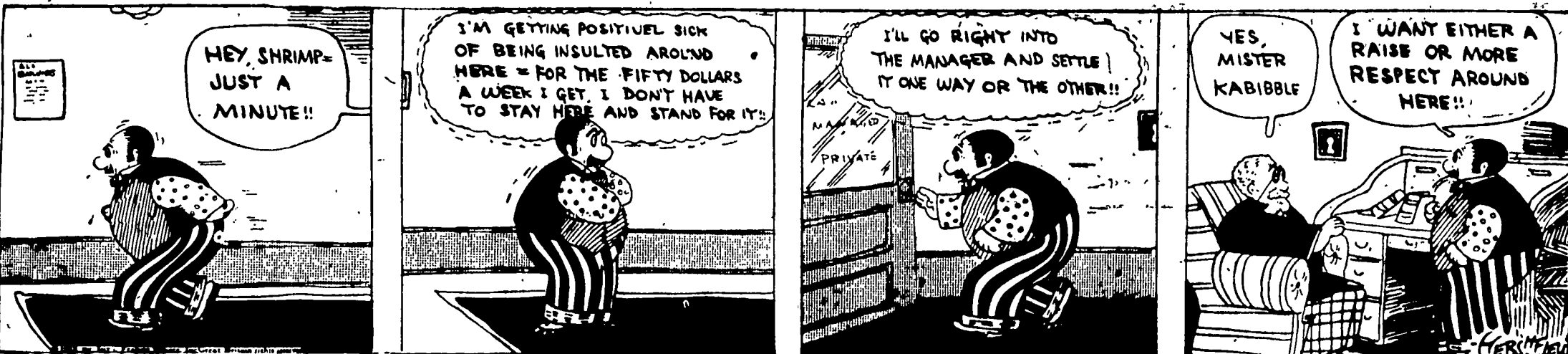

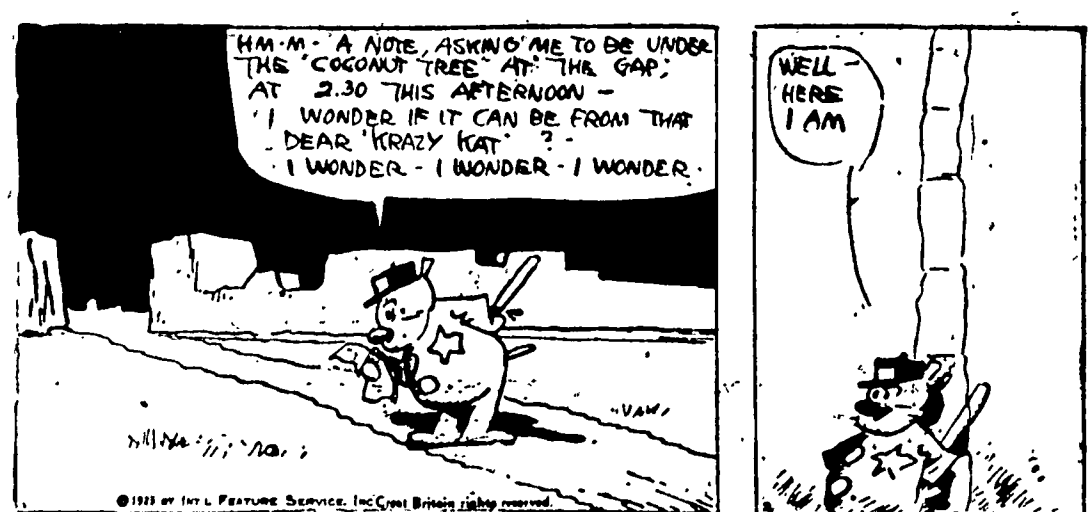
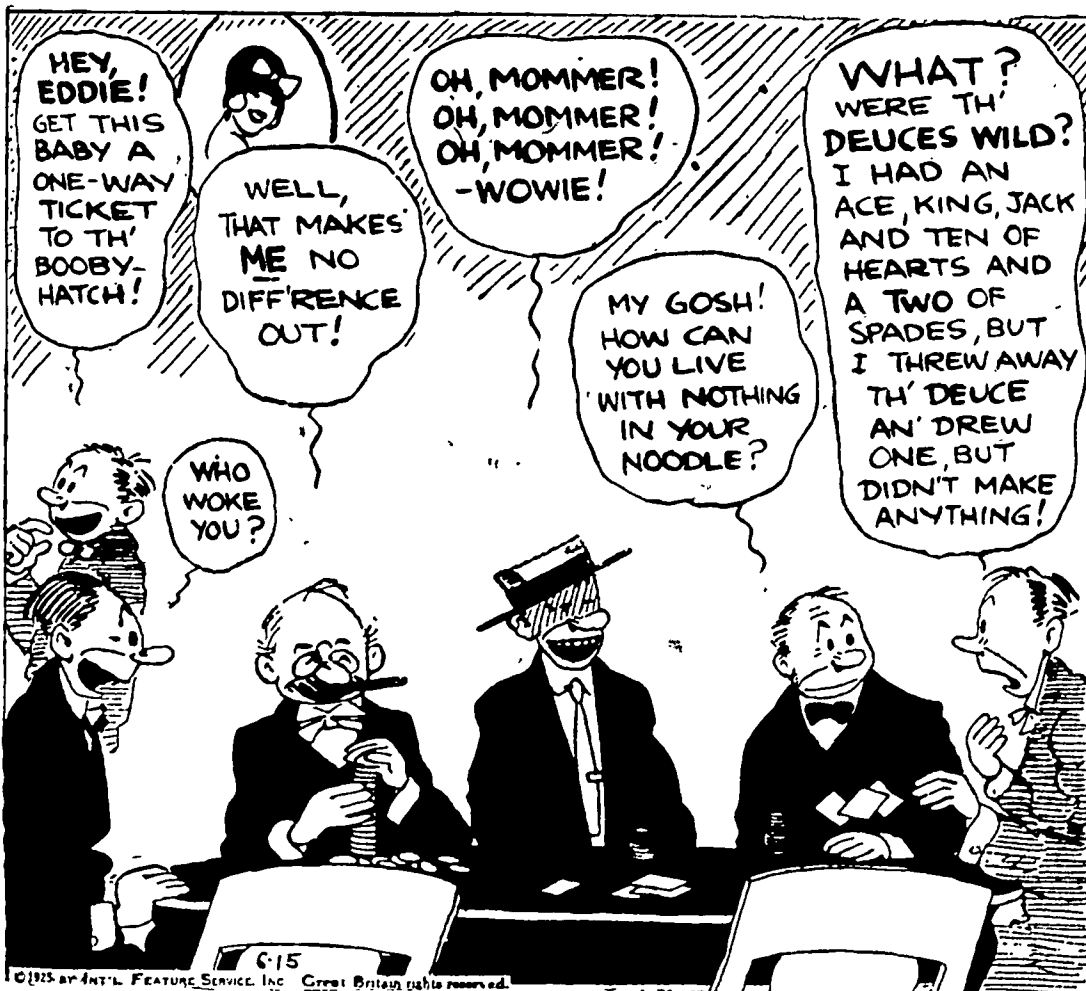

SIX C. R. STUDENTS GRADUATED AT AMES

AMES, June 15.—Four hundred and ninety-nine students walked out of State gymnasium this noon with diplomas conferred on them by Iowa State college. This brings the total number of graduates from the college this year to 758, diplomas having been awarded to 259 students at the end of previous college terms.

John Hammill, governor of Iowa, delivered the commencement address. R. A. Pearson, president of the college conferred honorary doctor of science degrees on Clyde W. Warburton director of the extension service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and a graduate in agriculture at Iowa State college in 1902, and George I. Christie, director of the agricultural experiment station and of the extension service at Purdue university, a graduate in agriculture from Iowa State college in 1904.

A certificate for eminent service to agriculture was presented to Peder Pedersen of Blackhawk county. Mr. Pedersen is one of the outstanding farmers of the state. The following students from Cedar Rapids were graduated: Hans Clifford Kullander, B. S. in mechanical engineering; Cameron H. Cooper, B. S. in dairying; Daniel Dewey Rubek, B. S. in chemical engineering; Charles R. Garrett, B. S. in civil engineering; Vivian Myrtle Fraser, B. S. in home economics; Florence A. Page, B. S. in home economics.
