He took three herds in his association that were as nearly alike in size, quality of animals and breed as possible and showed the difference in not profit over feed cost that each of the three showed for the last year. One had incurred a feed cost of \$\frac{4}{3}\text{11 9 a head, another \$\frac{4}{3}\text{.99}\$ and the other \$\frac{5}{6}\text{.15}\$. Profit over feed cost for these three on the basis of a tencow herd was \$\frac{6}{9}\text{.70}\$. \$\frac{7}{6}\text{.20}\$ and \$\frac{5}{9}\text{.70}\$. 


